Finding common ground

Reflections on a recent British Council sponsored visit to East Jerusalem and the West Bank

Between 11 and 13 June 2006, as guests of the British Council, John Cook (ALT President) and Seb Schmoller (ALT Executive Secretary) visited East Jerusalem and the West Bank, and universities in Hebron, Ramallah, and Bethlehem, with a video-conference to institutions in Nablus and Gaza. The purpose of the visit was to set up study exchanges and meet colleagues from Palestinian Higher Education.

John and Seb met heads of centres, heads of quality, learning technologists, directors of technology, lecturers and students. Their general impression was that colleagues in Palestine are using learning technology to provide flexible learning opportunities and to promote commerce. Plans are now being made for a British Council pre-conference workshop at ALT-C 2006.





Case study

Virtual Instruments: Visualising and Logging Science and Engineering experiments

A virtual instrument (VI) is a multimedia tool that can be used to present information on an experiment prior to students performing it in the laboratory. What makes a VI



unique is its capability to automatically log experimental data as the experiment progresses. Seven VIs have recently been piloted with over 200 engineering and physics students at Dublin City University (DCU). This case study


presents evidence that students learn more effectively from VIs compared to the non-instrumented traditional laboratories. The method of implementation of these VIs, which can be adapted to any discipline area, is also discussed.

Executive Secretary's report

News from Seb Schmoller

New organisational membership tariffs: We are in the process of inviting the large number of smaller HE institutions, FE Colleges, and Sixth Form Colleges who are not organisational members to join ALT, by drawing their attention to the new (and substantially lower!) membership fees. This has resulted from ALT having adopted a banded membership tariff. You can check if your organisation is a member, on the ALT web site.

ALT Strategy: Since early 2003 we have had an annually revised three-year strategy. The current version is at: **www.alt.ac.uk/docs/ALT_strategy_20060223.pdf**. On 22 June 2006 members of the ALT Central Executive Committee and all four of our main committees (Further Education, Membership Services, Research, and Publications), along with most of the ALT staff, attended an "awayday" at Glasgow Caledonian University's Saltire Learning Centre. The purpose of the day was to review the strategy and to propose revisions. A wide range of major changes to the strategy were identified. Over the next three months a new strategy will be written. This is likely to be finalised by the ALT Central Executive Committee in November, to take effect early in 2007.

DfES e-Strategy: Last year DfES finalised its "Harnessing Technology" e-Strategy. On 7 November 2006, Becta will be hosting, for England, a national conference about the e-Strategy, involving representatives from all types of publicly funded educational institutions. A "National Partners Group" has been set up to shape the event and ALT is one of the 20 or so organisations represented on the Group.

JISC Partnership Agreement: I reported in the last edition of the Newsletter that ALT had signed a formal Partnership Agreement with the JISC at the JISC Conference on 14 March. Subsequently we have agreed with JISC a plan of activities for the next 12 months. The main theme for these activities is "supporting the development of the community of learning technology researchers and practitioners in the UK, their professional development, and their engagement with the work of JISC and ALT." One of the first outcomes of the plan in action is the inclusion in the webbased version of the ALT Newsletter of a regular column by Craig Wentworth, JISC Development Director for User Environments. Other aspects of the plan include a commitment to work with ALT to raise awareness of CMALT, ALT's certified membership scheme, and jointly to investigate the need for and feasibility of developing a learning technology community web site.

Software reviews

PebblePad

PebblePad is an eportfolio system developed by Pebble Learning in collaboration with the University of Wolverhampton. This review sets out the main functions of the Pebblepad eportfolio system and describes the experience of setting up and running a year-long pilot project using this tool at City University. The scheme has been running for eight months and the review reports informally on experience to date in advance of the formal evaluation that will be completed at the end of the year's trial.

Sound opportunities with Horizon Wimba Voice Tools
