The demise of the UKeU in 2004 damaged e-learning progress, as well as the reputations of some of those involved. However, at least one initiative generated by the UKeU has subsequently gone from strength to strength. ALT-N interviewed Ellen Roberts and Jane Lund who run the University of York's completely on-line Masters in Public Policy and Management, one of the UKeU's first and only courses. This article examines the reasons for the course's success and attempts to analyse the pros and cons of involvement with what turned out to be an (albeit well-intentioned) e-learning debacle.

Learners in the English Further Education sector are having their learning and assessment opportunities enhanced by mobile devices. The Mobile Learning Network project (www.molenet.org.uk), MoleNET, is the result of a £7.2m initiative funded by contributions from the Learning and Skills Council and participating institutions, managed and supported by the Learning and Skills Network. This update provides an outline of MoleNET's unique collaborative approach to encouraging, supporting, expanding and promoting mobile learning. A range of mobile and handheld devices, including mobile phones, Personal Digital Assistants (PDAs); Mp3 players; handheld games and Ultra-Mobile PCs (UMPCs), are to be used to support learning in many different curriculum areas.
